THANKFULNESS

"Whenever you are tempted to grumble, come to Me and talk it out. As you open up to Me, I will put My thoughts in your mind and My song in your heart.

There are so many things you would like to be different; in yourself, in others, in the world. You natural tendency is to brood over these matters rather than talking them over with Me. The longer you focus on these negatives, the more likely you are to be disgruntled. Even when you control what you say out loud, your thoughts tend to be full of complaints. I will help you learn to think My thoughts.

Trust Me by opening up to Me consistently. Don't wait till you're already discouraged to bring Me your concerns. As we talk about these matters, remember to thank Me. In spite of how you're feeling, you can thank Me for listening and caring; also for loving you sufficiently to die for you. Your gratitude will provide a helpful framework for the things that concern you. Talk about these matters with Me; let the Light of My Face shine upon you as we discuss them. Eventually, this heavenly light will break through the fog in your mind, enabling you to see things from My perspective. Your communion with Me will bless you in another way also: you will find in My Presence irrepressible Joy. Whether or not I change your circumstances, you will discover I have given you a new song - a hymn of praise."

It should be a wonderful time of fellowship as we gather to THANK God for His goodness.





We get to be used by God in ways we never imagined!

*You will meet new friends! Loneliness is an unfortunate problem in the current times. We text more than we talk and connect with people on social media more than we do in person. Serving changes all that. While serving, you will get to know others, build relationships, laugh together, learn together, and grow together. I have found this to be true in my life! *Serving gives us an opportunity to put our faith into action. Serving helps us grow in our faith. Scripture tells us that "Faith without deeds is useless." James 2:20. *Serving is good for your health!! In the book entitled "The Healing Power of Doing Good," author Allan Luks discovered that 'Retired men who volunteer one day a week live two and a half times longer than retired men who don't volunteer at all.' What do YOU have to offer? More than you probably think. You have the gifts and talents you were born with. The passion that inspires you. The blessing of education. The skills you've honed as you've worked at home or in the workforce. The life experiences that have matured you. The pain that has deepened you. The love that spills from God's heart into yours."

SIMPLE WAYS TO MINISTER IN A NURSING HOME

As many as 60 percent of those living in nursing homes do not have regular visitors. Have you ever considered building relationships with the residents at a home near you?

I still have fond memories of my grandfather, who must have been at least 70 years old at the time, announcing every afternoon that he was heading down to the local nursing home to "call bingo for the old folks."

The irony might have been lost on Grandpa that he was already more advanced in years than some of the "old folks" he was going to visit. It didn't matter. He was mobile, he was able, and he was ready to serve.

Studies suggest that as many as 60 percent of nursing home residents do not have regular visitors. Some of them are what have been termed "elder orphans" — men and women who have no surviving spouse or family members to visit them at the facility.

For these precious souls, life in a nursing home can be a sad, lonely existence. Their basic needs are being met — food, shelter, medical care, and so on — but their thirst for love and fellowship goes unquenched.

If you and your family have a burden for those who are suffering in this way, you might consider visiting a nursing home near you and building relationships with some of the residents there. Even if you don't have a relative living in a facility, many nursing homes have communal areas where residents can meet with visitors during the day.

Do a little research first to make sure you're up to speed on the do's and don'ts of visiting a nursing home, and then consider these four ways you might be able to help a lonely resident feel noticed, valued and loved:

Game Time!

This is where Grandpa excelled. He went to the nursing home every afternoon and called numbers for the daily bingo game. Of course, he wasn't just calling numbers. He was engaging and laughing with the residents and making them feel important. Don't feel like you have to organize the games yourself. Many facilities have planned daily activities and the necessary materials, but they often need volunteers to facilitate them! Inquire with the facility's management about ways you might get involved with activities they already have on the calendar.

Beauty Shop

My wife used to paint fingernails for residents of a senior center in her hometown. The ladies were always delighted when she showed up to add some color to their lives! Don't expect to just march into a random nursing home and start painting fingernails, of course. That's a recipe for a lawsuit, or at least some strange looks. However, if you inquire with the management first, you're likely to get an enthusiastic response. Just be sure to follow the facility's protocols.

If you've got skills on the guitar or piano, or if you're brave enough to lead songs a cappella, consider using those talents at a local nursing home. Inquire with the facility about specific times and settings that might work best for group singing.


Book Club

Depending on the age, demographics and abilities of the residents in your facility, you might consider establishing an ongoing book club. If not everyone is up for reading on their own and joining in a group discussion, you could read out loud in front of the group or even one-on-one with specific residents. Be sensitive about diving into the Bible or a Christian devotional unless it's obvious that everyone in your group is open to it. Otherwise, consider other genres like poetry, U.S. history, presidential biographies, literary classics and other titles that will likely appeal to members of "the greatest generation."

However you choose to invest in the lives of nursing home residents, know that your *time* and *attention* are the most valuable gifts you can give. It's not just about playing games, painting nails, singing or reading. It's about letting often overlooked and neglected men and women know that they are loved, that they are important, and that they matter.

As the psalmist implored the Lord, many nursing home residents are saying, "Do no cast me away when I am old; do not forsake me when my strength is gone" (Psalm 71:9, NIV).

With the donation of your time and the investment of some creativity, you could be the answer to their prayers.

American Baptist Churches of the Dakotas had four representatives among the 40 International Ministries people mentioned. Our Associate executive minister, Rev. Ruth Skarr was part of that team. This was a great gathering in a part of the world that is under heavy attack from the enemy. Please pray for our missionaries who serve there and other dark places in our troubled world.

The 2019 India Baptist Summit was at Hyderabad, India on October 3 - 6. The theme of this summit was "That All of Them May be One." There were about 1,500 domestic delegates, and about 60 foreign delegates attended summit. It was our privilege to lead a team of six delegates from Hong Kong and Singapore to participate the India Baptist Summit. There are 4 General Secretaries from the foreign Baptist conventions: Singapore, South Korea, Nepal and Hong Kong. The General Secretary of Hong Kong brought greetings to the delegates and described the current Hong Kong social movement. He also encouraged the audience to pray for Hong Kong, especial for unity among the Hong Kong churches. The IM team had about 40 people. It was so great to see old friends and meet new friends from US. Although the people at the summit are so diverse, they were sitting together and enjoying worship and fellowship. It was exciting to watch many groups of people dressed in their outfits presenting dances and praise songs. With so many Baptist churches in India today, we praise the Lord that He has called many missionaries to India since 1793.
