In celebration of the rich 40-plus year legacy of the Retired Ministers and Missionaries Offering (RMMO) on behalf of American Baptist Churches USA (ABCUSA), we gratefully acknowledge the loving devotion of those who have so faithfully answered their call to serve God. Our theme this year, RMMO – Honoring the Service of God's Servants uplifts the generosity, grace and tireless work of retired ministers, missionaries and their widowed spouses and families who have dedicated their lives to serving the body of Christ.

As Christians, we are called to honor one another with the love of Christ as found in the scripture from 1 Thessalonians 5:12-13 (NIV) which teaches, "Now we ask you, brothers and sisters, to acknowledge those who work hard among you, who care for you in the Lord and who admonish you. The long-standing tradition of the RMMO established in 1977 supports ministers, missionaries and their widowed spouses who have devoted 15 years or more to ABCUSA. As one of four offerings from ABCUSA, this offering is unique because it provides individual recognition to those who have served the ABCUSA family. The RMMO is a personal offering, one rooted in thanks for the countless ways ministers and missionaries guide members of the church toward faithful and committed discipleship and diligent service in mission.



FOCUS ON FAMILY®

Do you find that holiday planning drives you and your spouse apart? Add a little joy to your Christmas season by getting organized together.

For the first several years of my marriage, I found myself being the Grinch (only with a less green hue). As the mom and stepmom of four teens, I was in charge of making *all* the Christmas magic happen — and my bag of tricks was quickly running empty.

So I began to wonder: Why was I in charge of Christmas dinner ... and Christmas shopping ... and Christmas travel ... and Christmas decorating ... and really, Christmas everything?

It was about five years into my marriage when I had finally had enough.

"Why is everything Christmas up to me?" I asked. "I really wish you would help!" (OK, that may have sounded less conversational and more whiny than I'd expected.)

"You do?" My husband, Roger, asked as he stood there looking genuinely puzzled.

"Yes!" I said incredulously. Didn't he see how stressed I was every single year?

"But you've never said that you wanted help! In fact, you plan everything on your own. I would love to help," Roger explained. "I miss decorating the tree, but I figured you liked it a certain way, so I let you do it that way."

"Oh," was all I could give as a response.

So, for years I had been martyring myself for no good reason. I had been feeling so alone in making Christmas preparations, and apparently the rest of the family thought that was the way I preferred it.

It took me years to figure out there was a better way to get through the holiday season. By being a little more purposeful in our planning, not only were Roger and I on the same side of the holiday battle, but we actually started appreciating each other's gifts, talents and even our differing temperaments.

Now my husband and I not only discuss who is going to do what on the to-do list, but we also talk about what is important to each of us during the Christmas season. This has made all the difference in how we come out on the other side of the holidays — we *choose* to be blessed or we *choose* to be stressed. We choose whether we simply survive the holidays or if we enjoy each other and the rest of our family. When we spend just a little time planning together, each of us has the

opportunity to enjoy what is important to us during the season. And that adds to our joy and peace throughout the coming weeks.

<u>Plan</u>

Get on the same page. Around Thanksgiving each year, Roger and I make a point to connect with each other and talk about what theme is important to us for the coming Christmas season. There have been years when *peace* was the word at the top of our theme list. During those years we decided to keep things simple, all the way down to ordering pizza from the takeout place around the corner as our Christmas Eve feast.

• Scotch tape and mailing tape, tissue paper, boxes, bows, tags, wrapping paper, scissors & gift bags.


Play

Pray for unrest in Bolivia and for our Global Servants J.D. and Ronda Reed and Sarah Nash serving there.

J.D. writes on 11/10 - If you have watched International news over the last three weeks you may have seen news about elections in Bolivia. On October 20, there were national elections held in Bolivia where the incumbent President was seeking a fourth term as Bolivian President along with seven other candidates. It is a long story, but in the process there was strong evidence that there was widespread election fraud on behalf of the president and his party. So on Tuesday, October 22, the majority of the country began a national civic strike that has continued on for twenty days now (as of Sunday, Nov. 10 when this was written). What this means in most of the major cities the streets were non-violently blockaded but in pockets there has been some violence and three deaths have occurred so far. It has been a hard three weeks for the people of Bolivia, no matter what side of the debate they fall on.

After a number of conversations with colleagues, other local missionaries in Bolivia, friends, our support team and the International Ministries leadership, it was determined that our family and our colleague, Sarah Nash, should return to the US and work remotely from here for a few weeks or until the situation comes to a resolution. We arrived in WV early this morning after a day of travel and will be here for at least a few weeks.

There was a big step forward this afternoon (Sunday, Nov. 10) when the President and the Vice President have confirmed that they will be resigning their positions and there will be new elections soon. This is a big step in the right direction, but the conflict is far from over. The national civic strike is going to continue on until the protesters are certain that there will be a lawful and fair transfer of power.

We will be returning to Bolivia as soon as the situation comes to a full resolution. Until that time, please join us in praying for Bolivia and its people. This has been called a battle for the Soul of Bolivia. Some others have said that this is one of the most pivotal moments in Bolivia's political history. Pray for the Bolivian Evangelical Community to be a light in this troubled time and that the Holy Spirit will empower them to lead the way to a new Bolivia. Pray for this wonderful country and its amazing people. Pray that there is reconciliation and unity and that the country of Bolivia will be

Dear Loved Ones,

Greeting. This week has been very interesting but also very challenging. We have on campus over 350 students' freshmen studying all day and from 7AM to 9 PM.



Interesting that we have
classes that are full to maximum capacity. At a time it becomes almost impossible

to quiet them down when they get excited over something. The classes are hot and we sweat a lot. Thank God that we almost have rain every night cooling us off.

Challenging-I have personally assisted in my classes when a student will faint or start crying because of pain that I cannot do anything about. This Wednesday AM a girl become some kind of ridged with her eyes sobbing with tears. I prayed for a medical doctor on campus. My assistant professor had to rush her to a nearby clinic where she was diagnosed with anxiety attack. Later I learned that since the morning the girl has not had a thing to eat. Anxiety attack or starvation?

In my PM class, another girl was rushed outside by her classmates. When I asked, I was told that she suffers of heart and that in AM class, the same girl fainted. What's in her heart, I was asking myself? God only knows. Before I finished teaching, my assistant professor whispered in my ears that we have a girl who has not eaten all day. I had to send her outside to be fed.

Every year, I tell my students to share their medical conditions with their friends, classmates so that we know what to do in case of crisis. I also insist to them that we are all one family. Ask in case of needs. We may not always have the answers, but it does not hurt to ask. Many do and many others do not listen.

We are here sharing the ups and downs of life with those we love.

Jeni Pedzinsk Updates




Greetings from Chiang Mai, Thailand! As most of you know, from August 29 - November 4, I traveled far and wide throughout the United States. The picture above gives you an idea of my route. Not every stop is documented, but you get the idea --- I was all over the place! It was a wonderful tour of 20 churches over the course of 10 weeks. The pace was demanding, but it was refreshing to reconnect with so many of you who

have shown me such care and lovingkindness. Some churches I visited had actually *never met me in person*, but have been supporting my work and New Life

Center for nearly five years! What a blessing to give and receive love - in person.

Last year, a high school junior at NIST International School in Bangkok contacted the New Life Center. She was founding an antitrafficking service group called Green Light at her school and was looking for a reputable organization with whom to partner. I began working closely with her and the (then) small group of girls, hoping that this relationship would broaden our residents' horizons and expose them



to other kids their own age who speak out for justice. Now in its second year, Green Light is 15 strong. Their project this fall was a "Hike for Freedom." Each student asked family and friends to sponsor them to scale the second highest peak in Thailand. They invited several NLCF residents, as well as myself, to join. The hike took place November 16-17 and was a wondrous, if at times harrowing experience for all. The students will continue raising funds for NLCF throughout this school year. Their goal is \$10,000.

If you or a group of which you are part is open to creative fundraising for New Life Center, please get in touch with me. I would love to brainstorm ideas with you! Shave your beard for a worthy cause ... hoola hoop for freedom ... a spicy noodle challenge ... the possibilities are endless!

Personally:

Language Lessons are starting up again! While I can speak "daily life" Thai proficiently, there are endless topics with specialized vocabulary that I haven't learned. One of these is - believe it or not - Bible and prayer vocabulary. I know some words, but not many, and not well. It is my goal this year to increase my proficiency in this area! Please pray for me in this new challenge.

Thanksgiving is not a locally observed holiday, so I'll have a normal workday. However, I'll have a special dinner with friends from church that evening.

Christmas is coming up, and I'll spend it with my adopted family here in Thailand. I was able to leave some wrapped presents back in the States for my own family, and I look forward to Skyping with them on their Christmas Eve, as is our tradition.
